- A. Democracy, Conflict, & Governance Program
- B. American Statecraft Program
- C. Nuclear Policy Program
- D. Technology & International Affairs Program: Seeking applicants with strong writing/communication and research skills.
- E. Middle East Program: Requires strong reading fluency in **Arabic**; ability to conduct academic as well as on-line research in Arabic. A strong background in ME politics and/or history is beneficial.
- F. International Security & Political Economy (to work with the South Asia Program): Quantitative data analysis and GIS skills are required. A strong mathematical background is a plus. An academic background in international relations theory or international political economy along with an interest in military issues is essential.
- G. Asia Program (Indo-Pacific Security): Requires **Mandarin** Chinese reading skills and familiarity with Asian security, defense and foreign policy issues are essential. Proficiency in Japanese, Bahasa, or another Asian language is a plus.
- H. Asia Program (China, Economics and Technology): Requires **Mandarin** Chinese language skills. A background in economics or emerging technologies is strongly preferred.
- I. Russia & Eurasia Program: Requires excellent **Russian** reading skills.
- J. Africa Program
- K. Global Order and Institutions: An academic background in international institutions and the management of transnational challenges is strongly preferred.
- L. Sustainability, Climate and Geopolitics: Basic data skills (such as helping create graphs or tables for Carnegie publications) are a plus. Applicants should have completed coursework related to sustainability and climate issues.
- M. Europe: Fluency and the ability to perform research in a European language other than English are a plus. Background knowledge on European politics is essential.
